The President's Column by Bruce Swiecicki

Inspirations---that's what I've named a document that I keep on my computer. It's made up of quotations from people, some who are famous and others not so much. These quotes are taken from newsletters that I receive during the week and when I read one that moves me, I add it to the document. It's a page and a half long after about a year.

Here's one that I never get tired of reading: "Perfection is not attainable. But if we chase perfection, we can catch excellence."—Vince Lombardi

Lombardi was a football coach from the 1960's and he had the reputation of being a cruel taskmaster who demanded nothing short of complete commitment from his players in their efforts to achieve the ultimate team goal. When I read that quote I can picture Lombardi, with a whistle around his neck as the night is settling in on the practice field, urging his linemen to "rehearse" the play one more time, choreographing each players movements and timing until the end result is what we used to see on Sundays, the famous "Packer Sweep" that was a hallmark of those great teams from the 1960's.

For all the bluster that surrounded Lombardi from those days, a different perspective was revealed about him in a book written by one of his players, Jerry Kramer, called "Instant Replay." As an adolescent, I really enjoyed reading books about sports heroes and although Vince Lombardi was not a hero of mine, I learned something from this "insider's view" of the man. The thing I remember most about the book was the players' love for Lombardi. Even though he felt Lombardi was particularly hard on him because he played the same position as the coach did when he was younger, there was no doubt that when Kramer and the others committed to be "all in" with Lombardi and each other, they formed a bond that would be unbreakable

In a sense, we here at UUCC are forging a similar bond. We are faced with the task of maintaining a sacred place of worship that is unique among many other options. We offer a haven to those seeking reprieve from the harshness of modern day living, a place where we can express ourselves and at the same time learn from one another new ways to inspire their lives and each other. No, we're not perfect; but, we can become excellent stewards of our faith.

Report on September 13th Board of Trustees Meeting

The following are some of the highlights from the Board of Trustees meeting August 21:

- The Board authorized up to \$400 to be spent on the 60th anniversary celebration that is scheduled to take place October 20th. Pat Segner is working very hard to make this a very special event.
- It was reported that the Corn Roast was enjoyed by many people and the net income to the church was \$45. Also, the "60 for 60" initiative has already brought in \$160 in contributions for the church.
- The Board voted to accept the proposal from Utermark Landscaping to remove the poison ivy, cut down the weeds around the church and install 18 inches of stone around the perimeter of the building to help in our pest control efforts.
- Melissa Schwartz resigned from the Board of Trustees for personal reasons. We thank Melissa for her service and wish her and her family well.

Respond Now thanks you again for the food and personal items you give.

The need continues to be great. Fresh fruits and vegetables are more often available for the clients, and the garden has done well. They had a successful Back-to-School festival at which backpacks and school supplies were given out in late July.

At a recent potluck luncheon, Debra Harper, from CEDA, spoke about the cooperation between Respond Now and CEDA, especially on low income energy assistance services. CEDA gets federal, state, and private funds for their PIP program with Com Ed ,which pays 10% of what is owed for those qualifying. Nicor also works with CEDA and Respond Now to pay \$75 - \$150 on higher bills for those qualifying. They also provide mortgage assistance and

reconnect assistance. In addition, CEDA will grant \$5,000 to weatherize (replace windows and furnaces) for homes of qualifying people.

Did you know that the poverty level for a family of four is about \$22,000 per year or \$1,833 per month? It would be difficult for one person to live on this, let alone four people. Suzie Brown

The Unitarian Universalist Community Church of Park Forest (UUCCPF) is celebrating its 60th Birthday next month! *Help us by giving a donation of a dollar a year, or \$60.*

Over those years, in the words of our past- president, Pat Segner, "We have worked together to bring forth our vision of love, diversity, and justice. Our vision includes fellowship, community, worship services, fun social events, justice issues, environmental causes, community outreach programs and religious education for children and adults."

Last year our congregation reluctantly but realistically voted to move forward with a sustainable budget for 2012-13 that would not include a professional minister. We can no longer afford to pay even a part time minister. I am now asking each of you for a contribution to help keep our church alive through these difficult financial times. These "**60 for 60**" donations will be used for needed upkeep on our building and grounds.

I first joined the UUCCPF almost 30 years ago so my young children, having a Christian mother (me) and a Muslim father (Nasser), would have a meaningful religious education. I left the church for a number of years, and now, after my children are all grown and living away from home, have become a regular member again: this time: for me. Nasser and I along with my sister, Julia, and whatever child is home for the Holidays, continue to attend our Christmas Eve service each year.

My father, Philip Sportolari, found this church after he retired from his long career as a professional Methodist choir director. He began to direct the choir at UUCCPF and enjoyed years of musical and spiritual inspiration. My mother, while her health permitted, worked to support the PADS (Public Action to Deliver Shelter) program the church staffs, and my father was especially drawn to "Respond Now." Both of my parents' ashes are buried in the Memorial Grove on the church grounds.

I remember fondly the past ministers that have served us, and the religious guidance they provided. I look forward to proceeding with lay led ministry and guest speakers from around our area. The church also holds memories for me of past members, both still living and those now departed, and serves as a place to meet and worship with friends who share similar values each week. What memories do you have of the UUCCPF? How has it enriched your life in the past? How might it enhance your life in the future? Are you comforted just to know the UUCCPF exists and is there for you whenever you might need it? I believe our world is a better place because churches like the UUCCPF exist...

October 14: "Care of the Earth." Is our planet at a tipping point for climate problems? If so, what can we do to alleviate?



Green Sanctuary Committee - by Robin Barrett

Fraises, jardiniere, leche, pan, grub, chow, spraetzle, weinerschnitzel, cerveza, vino, agua de coco, samosas, sushi, fry bread....Food! Food! Food! We all eat. Some of us a lot, some a little. Some consume high quality, fresh, nutritious meals. Some quite the opposite. For us, here in the Midwest, it is our season of luscious abundance. May we acknowledge the origin, work and sacrifice that brings this feast to our tables. May our eyes be open and our hearts soft to our connection and place on the food chain.

Food programs, initiatives, festivals, pancake breakfasts, fund raising brunches, presentations, books...serendipitous transversals. It is a wonderful time of year. The cooler temps and blue skies dotted with white clouds are reminiscent of Heavenly ski area in Tahoe. All is within our reach.

Jim Kinney, spoke about what he views as a future world food crises, at last month's Common Grounds gathering in Flossmoor. He was relatively optimistic about our ability to solve the problems given that three main international groups talk and cooperate. Conventional farmers, big agriculture and organic farmers working together can produce what we will need, internationally, and have a minimum negative impact on the health of the planet by combining resources, motivations and knowledge. He also mentioned that the world population is predicted to top out at less than previously predicted. He was not as positive in reference to the water issue. The Colorado River no longer flows to the ocean decreased in width from one and half miles in 1950 to about 250 yards at present. The Oglala Aquifer is no longer of use to us because of it's decrease in depth. Both of these changes are due to human diversions of waters and irrigating desert areas like Phoenix to replace native ecosystems with crops like lettuce and golf courses. He predicted that the Midwest would eventually shift from being our breadbasket to a panorama of wind farms. He very emphatically stated that the US and Canada needed to stop using food for ethanol immediately. The use of corn for our cars has had a very negative impact on the cost of corn throughout the world. Please see Green Sanctuary hall bulletin board for handouts from Kinney's presentation.

The Unitarian Universalist Ministry For The Earth mentions both World Food Day, October 16, <u>www.churchworldservice.org</u> (type "wfd" in the search box and click the page link to see a list of all materials) and Food Day, October 24 (<u>www.foodday.org</u>) in it's fall newsletter. The entire newsletter is also on the hall bulletin board.

The UUCCPF Convener Council voted for our congregation's participation in the Top Box program. This is an inter church project that brings wholesome, low cost food to areas that do not have ready access to grocery stores. The program accepts LINK and SNAP. I will be trying out several of their packages, especially the ones that provide PIE. I am hoping it is apple. You may order online, <u>www.topboxfoods.com</u> and pay when you pick up at St. Irenaeus in Park Forest. Our church will receive 5% of the sales. Please see hall bulletin board or call 312-527-7890 for more info. Many thanks to Barb Morris for bringing this community service fund raiser to us.

Park Forest Environmental Committee which meets the first Thursday of every month has initiated, maintained and supported two community gardens. Dave Bartlet, Pat and Fred Segner, Irene Van Der Hook and Maggie and Marti all have on site fresh food growing at their homes. Are there any other home food gardens out there? Please feel free to post photos on the Green Sanctuary Bulletin Board. "Food Matters", a documentary film about nutrition, health, and disease will be shown at our social issues movie night on Saturday, October 27 @ 7pm.

The "Teaching Assistant"

I'm using this newsletter article to make a request. 




