The President's Column September 2023 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo



Sixty years ago on August 28, 1963, the March on Washington took place with a quarter of a million people attending. It was a memorable and historic occasion on that day with speakers like Roy Wilkins, John Lewis, and actors Ossie Davis and

Ruby Dee. Performers like Mahalia Jackson, Marian Anderson, Joan Baez, and Bob Dylan entertained the crowds. It was a hot day and many people sat with their feet in the reflecting pool near the Lincoln Memorial. But the most remembered event of the day was the iconic "I Have a Dream" speech given by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The words of his speech have been studied and memorized by school children across this country as a message of hope for racial unity and peace for the future.

Fast forward to now. On Saturday, August 26, this march was repeated to commemorate that event. The son and daughter of Martin Luther King Jr and his granddaughter, Yolanda Renee King, spoke, telling us that "past generations...have failed us" when it comes to fulfilling her grandfather's vision of America. And she is right, of course. It has been determined that for the first time our children have fewer rights than during her grandfather's generation. We are being stripped of the hard-earned rights that the Civil Rights Movement, the Women's Movement, LGBTQ+ Movement, etc., fought so hard to achieve.

In his "Letter from a Birmingham Jail" (1963), MLK Jr argued that we have a moral responsibility to break unjust laws and to take direct action rather than waiting passively and potentially forever for justice to come down from the courts. He wrote this in response to fellow clergymen who criticized his non-violent direct-action activities as "unwise and untimely." He knew that the white power structure in this country would not give up nor share power unless forced to do so. If they had been capable of compassion and equality, they would have been compelled to make fundamental changes already. It was naïve to think otherwise. "Justice too long delayed is justice denied", as Dr. King remarked. But real non-violent change would have to come at a cost.

And still it continues today. At the time that young Yolanda Renee King was delivering her speech, a 21-year-old white man in Jacksonville, Florida, was preparing to "kill black people" out of his hatred for them, with his legally purchased AK-15 and other guns. We have been seeing a huge increase in these unprovoked murders during the past decades directed toward black, Jewish, LGBTQ+, school children, college students, in stores, schools, churches and synagogues, shopping malls, grocery stores, theaters, etc. Our children now must undergo drill training on how to survive an attack in their schools as part of the curriculum. And yet, many politicians remain mute on this subject out of party affiliation or financial support from the NRA. The laws are not being changed to prevent this carnage as long as the white power structure is untouched.

Thus, one of our biggest challenges to our times is how to solve the problem of easy access to guns and too many guns already in the hands of our population. As long as our government is in control

of politicians funded by the NRA, no real common sense gun laws will be passed. These politicians must be voted out of office in order to break this stalemate. But there may be some light on the horizon. As these conservative politicians and courts continue to strip the citizens of this country of their rights and rescind the laws that we have already fought for and won, much of our population is taking account of this and hopefully will vote for those who will bring true progressive change in the 2024 election. Therefore, the importance of voting has never been more important. We must break this vicious cycle of mass shootings.

As Dr. King wrote from that jail cell in Birmingham sixty years ago, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." We as Unitarian Universalists understand this, just as Viola Liuzzo and Rev. James Reeb, both UUs, understood this during the Civil Rights struggle. And we must continue to play a role in working to put an end to gun violence.

This mid-harvest celebration is about bowing to change, expressing gratitude for how far we've come this year and what we have, and — as a time of nearly equal light and dark — inviting in balance. It's a time for welcoming transitions and transformation, for getting closer to who we are at our core, and preparing to turn inward.



Spiritually, it encourages introspection and the recognition of the dualities within ourselves and the world around us.

Ways to celebrate:

Feasting – Have friends over to share in a harvest meal featuring seasonal foods, i.e. beet salad, corn bread, squash soup, apple pie, etc.

Yoga – Take time to practice your balance with yoga. You may want to try the <u>Sun Salutation</u> to give thanks to the sun for the energy that created our bounty of fruits and vegetables.

Dualities – Meditate on your dualities, i.e. masculine / feminine, parent / child, introvert / extrovert, giver / receiver, etc. Are they in balance? Do you need to focus on particular ones to achieve balance?

Bonfire – Fire is transforming, converting one thing into another: sand into glass; wood into ash; raw food into cooked. Build a campfire or even a fire in your weber grill to observe the dancing flames and to witness transformation. At this time of turning, ponder what needs to be transformed in your life and how to achieve it.

If you look at North America, by Swiss RE projections, we are in one of the better locations for taking the least hit on Global Warming economic consequences when we are in the most severe case.

If you look below the green column at the top of the table, everyone is below our 9.5% north American worst case. I hope you don't mind if I'm pessimistic on us staying below the green column and yet hopeful it can happen if you understand what I mean.

If we go to the severe case column, which I am optimistic won't happen. If we compare the different areas of the earth Asia at -26.% decrease in economy, Middle East and Africa at -27.6% and ASEAN at -37%.

There are lots of angles to this I haven't explored yet. Its one of things you put under your hat and see if it is unfolding. One easy little tidbit is that this enters into politics also. So this summer we are having some pretty strong heat waves. Some of the Texas cities are now making mandated water breaks during these hot times. The Texas state legislature has now overridden the cities

making it so they can't mandate these water breaks. I am all too familiar with how our country is divided on issues. This one is going to make people sick and some will die from heat exposure. Hopefully we can come to our senses on this issue.

It is with heavy hearts that we announce the passing of The Rev. Dr. Finley C. Campbell

On the evening of August 18, Rev. Dr. Finley C. Campbell passed away peacefully at his home in Hyde Park, Chicago, surrounded by family and friends. He is survived by wife Roberta (Bobbi); children Phillip, Paulette, and David; co-children Kathi and Mark; grandchildren Taylor, Bryanna, Lya, Lanny, Laïssa, and Anastasia.

Finley was born in Anderson, South Carolina, on September 23, 1934. When he was 8, his family moved to Detroit, where he lived until 1952. Finley studied English and American Literature at Morehouse College in Atlanta from 1952 – 1958. In 1959, while earning his M.A. at Atlanta University, Finley spent a year studying French at the Sorbonne University in Paris, where he met his first wife Liliane, who lived in Geneva, Switzerland. After their marriage, she had to "pass as Black" for them to be able to live together legally in Georgia.

In 1961 he was ordained as a Baptist minister. In 1960 he started teaching at Morehouse College and became active in the Civil Rights movement after the murder of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., in 1968. In 1969 he moved his family to Crawfordsville, Indiana, where he taught at Wabash College. He received a Ph. D with honors in English Literature from the University of Chicago in 1969, where John Hope Franklin helped supervise his dissertation.


Finley was a co-founder of the InterNational Committee Against Racism. In 1972 he moved to Madison, Wisconsin, where he organized both the Black Studies department as well as a chapter of InCAR. In 1977 he moved to Chicago to work with InCAR. His teaching positions in Chicago included UIC and DeVry. In 1971 he married his second wife, Vicky. He married Bobbi, his current wife, in 1986. They both joined the First Unitarian Church in Hyde Park, Chicago in 1992.

Finley was influential in the church, joining the Social Justice Council, the Racial Justice Task Force, being very active in the Men's Group, the Global Studies discussion group, and as a member of the church's board of trustees. For many years he taught "The Nature of Racism" at the church, examining a different aspect of institutional racism each year. More recently he founded the Unitarian Universalist Multiracial Unity Action Council.

Finley's principled anti-racism, so thoroughly uncompromising, led him to an understanding that is still not grasped by many people: that racism in many forms globally is the obstacle that holds back all social progress. That the majority of people, working class people, from all racial and ethnic groups, are harmed by this division, and that it is foolish and dangerous to blame so-called "white" people as a whole for these problems. He fought for multi-racial unity against racism and all other forms of economic, political, social, and cultural discrimination. His work bore fruit, not just in UUMUAC, but in the tens of thousands who have been directly and indirectly influenced by his work and who, in turn, will carry that forward. He leaves a hole in the hearts and minds of all who knew him.

Finley's dissertation, The Bloody Chasms: A Descriptive Analysis of Reconstruction in American Literature 1865-1885, will be published soon by Dorrance Publishing. In lieu of flowers, donations can be made to UUMUAC (Box 267, 1448 E. 52nd St., Chicago IL 60615) and to a scholarship fund in Finley's name for literature students pursuing topics of multi-racial unity at Wabash College (301 W Wabash Ave, Crawfordsville IN 47933).

Freedom Seekers and the Underground Railroad in Northeastern Illinois

In a recent article in the Chicago Tribune, Rev. Larry McClellan, shared his thoughts on a recent tour he led of Underground Railroad sites in the south suburbs and on his new book.

In Larry's words, "In trying to understand the history of the Chicago Southland, I ran into these references of the Underground Railroad. Again and again in Underground Railroad accounts, the fugitive slaves are described by the way people did heroic things to help them. That's upside down. The really remarkable stories are the ones

of the people who made the decision to seek their freedom. We have to tell the freedom seeker stories," McClellan said. "That's where the real power is. That's where the whole process needs to be humanized."

The result of that realization became <u>"Onward to Chicago: Freedom Seekers and</u> <u>the Underground Railroad in Northeastern Illinois,"</u> just out from Southern Illinois University Press.
