

I celebrated my seventy-first birthday last Saturday (the 23rd). Well, not exactly "celebrated" it as I am no longer excited to mark yet another passage of a year at this point. It has left me thinking about our individual mortality and how to grace-

fully approach the eventual end of my life. (Forgive me for the rather morbid subject matter this month, but this is an eventuality we all face, and it weighs on my mind).

As I approach the final decade(s?) of my life, I am first struck by all the ways my body is seemingly starting to let me know that it is no longer functioning without glitches. Yes, I had discovered when I was about fifty that I had inherited a genetic mistake that was set to go off like an alarm clock at the height of adulthood. This genetic misstep was determined at the precise moment when my parents created me but was not to appear until decades later in the form of muscle weakness. How are you dealing with this new reality? I hope it hasn't been too difficult up to this point. We watch the television commercials that chide us into believing that we are in our "golden" years and the need to be taking the Centrum "Silver" vitamins as befits our new and august status. That is, until social media steps in to remind us that everything important in life is still the jurisdiction of the young. They are at center stage in our society, and we get their not-too-subtle reminders daily. Case-in-point: our poor President Joe Biden. Can you imagine how it must feel to be him these days when all day and every day he must hear the poll results of our country's opinion that he is now too old to run again for president? And the truly saddest aspect of this is that he has done a demonstrably great job over the past three years in being able to get his agenda passed through the current House and Congress made up of a sizeable fringe minority of lunatics...not to mention the lowest unemployment rates and economic successes in many decades.

Jokes abound in life about the pratfalls of getting old. We see them every day, so I do not feel compelled to repeat any here in this article. I know I have come to love and admire many in this church, and I miss dearly many who have "moved on." I have no answers to any of these life questions. I am just a fellow traveler. I have had a pretty good life, done a lot of things, seen many sights, and I am hoping for a bit more time here with you all. And isn't that what we all are wishing for?


Religious and Character Education

I have used the word many times describing what is happening in the United States and the world "Transition". In this case transition is what I am describing as converting over from our fossil fuel energy system to one of clean energy and the products that can utilize it. Most of the time I am talking about electric cars and this time will be no different. There is a different twist to this transition, in that an article talks about the gas cars we throw away and being replaced by electric cars.

I'll start with acronyms ICE (internal combustion engine). One that burns gas. BEV (battery electric vehicle). One that uses electricity rather than gas.

RMI, who worked in partnership with the Bezos Earth Fund, writes in <u>a report re-</u> leased today called "X-change: Cars, The end of the ICE age" that the market share of internal combustion engine (ICE) cars is going to fall to a level of 14-38% of sales by 2030.

I read on the internet every day on this issue and that is a change far greater than other organizations are predicting. What really happens in the next 7 years, we can only wait and see. Just the same, that is a huge change.

RMI assumes the life of a car to be around 15 years. Over the past decade, RMI writes, the number of gas cars scrapped annually has been between 40 and 50 million. But using historical data from Bloomberg New Energy Finance (BNEF), RMI estimates that the gas car scrappage rate will climb to between 60 and 70 million annually by 2030, based on the number of gas car sales 15 years ago, which was at around 80 million.

New car sales are going down and the scrappage will be significant. At some point there will be less new car sales than the scrappage.

RMI gives the example that in 2022, there were sales of 64 million gas cars and scrappage of 42 million. So the net growth was 22 million. But by 2025, more gas cars will be scrapped than sold, meaning the overall fleet of gas cars will peak that year, and then will be in freefall by 2030. RMI's research shows that by 2030, the gas fleet is likely to be falling at a rate of 40 to 70 million per year, or 3-7%. Continued

2025 will see the break even point of no new growth in ICE vehicles. This is more rapid change than I had imagined just a few years ago. The gas car fleet will decrease by millions per year. I never had this picture in mind of what this would look like. I was just excited to just see EV sales increasing.

And, the researchers say, since gas cars account for around 25% of global oil demand (and made up more than 33% of oil demand growth between 2010 and 2019), demand for oil is also going to freefall in the future, thanks to EV adoption and efficiency.

Not only now are ICE vehicle sales going down, the dominance of the ICE vehicle will increase, the demand for oil will also decrease. I have been waiting for this time for about 25 years. Advocating renewable energy since the 1990s and writing about global warming since about 2006. Parts of our society are sad to see this happening. There will be people confused and angry about this transition. My part is to see what I can do and advocate for this transition that we are in the middle of. Being we are a progressives in identity, we look to the rest of our society to help see this transition through for the good of humanity.





Freedom Seekers and the Underground Railroad in Northeastern Illinois

Rev. Larry McClellan Sunday Speaker October 15, 2023 at 10:00 AM After the service Larry is scheduled for a discussion and book signing.

In a recent article in the Chicago Tribune, Rev. Larry McClellan, shared his thoughts on a recent tour he led of Underground Railroad sites in the south suburbs and on his new book.

In Larry's words, "In trying to understand the history of the Chicago Southland, I ran into these references of the Underground Railroad. Again and again in Underground Railroad accounts, the fugitive slaves are described by the way people did heroic things to help them. That's upside down. The really remarkable stories are the ones

of the people who made the decision to seek their freedom. We have to tell the freedom seeker stories," McClellan said. "That's where the real power is. That's where the whole process needs to be humanized."

The result of that realization became <u>"Onward to Chicago: Freedom Seekers and</u> <u>the Underground Railroad in Northeastern Illinois,"</u> just out from Southern Illinois University Press.

We would like a picture of each of you around water or using water. For example, swimming, fishing, kayaking, looking at a lake, taking a drink, even washing the dog.



Edgars Place is proud to present Buddy Mondlock. A native of Park Forest he has had an outstanding careeer. Buddy writes songs. He does it so well that some great songwriters have recorded his songs on their own albums. Guy Clark, Nanci Griffith, and Janis Ian, to name just a few. You might've heard his song "The Kid" (recorded by David Wilcox, Peter, Paul and Mary and Cry, Cry, Cry). When Buddy made his first trip to Texas from his native Chicago, Guy Clark heard him singing one of his songs under a tree at the Kerrville Folk Festival and liked it. So Guy went back to Nashville, opened the door and said, "listen to this kid, he's good!" A publishing deal soon followed.

People were starting to pay attention. In 1987 he was a New Folk Award Winner at Kerrville and he released his first album called "On the Line". Over the next few years David Wilcox recorded "The Kid" on his first record for A&M. Buddy did some writing with this other new kid in town named Garth Brooks (they had the same manager). Janis Ian heard him singing at the Bluebird Cafe and asked him if he'd like to write with her. Their song "Amsterdam" got recorded by Joan Baez. Nanci Griffith asked Buddy to sing on a show she was taping for Irish television. She ended up liking that song so much that she recorded "Comin' Down In the Rain" on her Grammy Award winning collection "Other Voices, Other Rooms." Garth became a star and "Every Now and Then" ended up on his album "The Chase."

Since then he's released a string of critically acclaimed solo recordings on his own label and EMI. And in 2003 Buddy toured North America and Europe with Art Garfunkel and Maia Sharp in support of their album "Everything Waits To Be Noticed" which they wrote and recorded together as a trio.


