The President's Column December 2023 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo



For some time now in 2023, you have been hearing information from our pulpit and in forums about the coming changes that are being proposed by the UUA in a rewrite of Article II of the UUA Bylaws. Our congregation will have a voice in

our choice to either accept these changes or reject them in June 2024. This is when history will be made in our UU religion. At that time, we will all have a responsibility to vote as to where we would like to see our church heading in the future.

When I first came to UUCC back when Yielbonzie was still here, I had already heard about Unitarian Universalism from my mother (Mary Lambertino) and my Aunt Emily (Zaber) for years, and I knew that my political views were quite closely aligned with what I was hearing. But it wasn't until I read the Seven Principles for myself that I was totally bowled over. Each Principle covered pretty much all aspects of life that are of importance to me. Now, those Principles (and Sources) are on the chopping board. My questions directed to the UUA are these: Why? Why now? Why do you feel that it is necessary to pull the rug out from under our (collective) feet at this point? And why do you feel that it must be done so quickly and with so little regard for the very democratic values that you espouse?

Rev. Denise Tracy gave a very moving sermon on November 19th where she expressed her concern that the process to make these major changes is happening too fast, especially considering past proposed changes that sometimes took years to accomplish. She posited that it would be better for all concerned if we took our time to discuss these proposed changes slowly. Fellow congregant Allan Lindrup has also been working to educate us on what these changes would entail through numerous forums and talks from the pulpit. Allan's efforts have helped familiarize us with the issues these changes would bring about.

No doubt, we are a small congregation, especially in comparison to many UU churches across the United States. But we are mighty as well. For one, we have survived for 70 years, espousing the same values along the way from the beginning. We became UUs *because* of these values. Now the very core of our values will be stripped away, and we are left scratching our heads as to why. In all my years on this planet I have come to the conclusion that the real reasons behind why this is happening will come out. They always do. It is very difficult to keep something like this secret for long and we will eventually learn more.

We will produce some additional materials soon to help you in understanding these complex issues at hand. It is important to familiarize yourself before voting next June. I urge each and every member of this congregation to familiarize yourselves with the facts and be sure to vote your conscience. Stay tuned for more.

Yule - Winter Solstice - December 21st

Yule or the Winter Solstice, marks the shortest day of the year and the longest night. Traditionally it has been seen as the rebirth of the sun and the return of the light. It is a time of fresh beginnings, rebirth, transformation, breaking bad habits, and creativity. Yule is a moment of hope in the hardest months of the year.

Symbols of Yule include evergreens, representing immortality; the Yule Log, representing the return of light and warmth; mistletoe, representing the coming fertility of spring; as well as wreaths, representing the wheel of the year and the completion of another cycle.

Here are some suggestions for how you can celebrate Yule:

- 1) Bonfire Enjoy the darkness and the cold. Sit outside at night, under a starry sky, with a blazing fire. Watch the dancing flames and reflect upon the year that has passed and ponder what growth you hope to accomplish moving forward.
- **2) Help those in need** With the returning light, there is returning hope. Help pass that on in the form of assistance for those in need. Monetary donations are always welcome, as are food donations. If possible, do something in-person, hands-on, such as volunteering at a soup kitchen or food pantry.
- **3) Yule Log** Find and decorate a log for Yule. Decorations can include ribbons, pine cones, red berries, evergreen trimmings, etc. Be intentional with your decorations, i.e. use each item to ponder changes you wish for the new year. What habits do you wish to banish from your life? What goals are you setting for yourself? Burn the Yule log to release the energy and blessings that you have put into it.

Climate change touches everything and everyone. We mostly hear about it in the news. People suffering in extreme heat waves never before experienced in their areas not needing air conditioning before that time. Thank god its them and not us. And yet this summer, I really got a taste of being effected by climate change. When smelling wood smoke from the Canadian forest fires while traveling along route 80. Cop 28 is coming up and its time to brush up on the state of the planet. I shortened up the article to give a brief overall picture in numbers around climate change. 1.3 degrees Celsius or 2.3 degrees Fahrenheit

There are a whole string of records broken, hottest years ever in the article. I would like to be able to conclude that life is only going to get better for everyone on earth from climate change. The realistic conclusion is that things are going to get more difficult for our humanity.

\$4.3 trillion. Global economic losses from climate disasters since 1970.

<u>Nearly 12,000 weather, climate and water-related disasters struck worldwide</u> over the last five decades, the World Meteorological Organization reports. They've caused trillions of dollars in damage, and they've killed more than 2 million people.

The added energy to our climate system brings out the extremes in the warmer direction. One of our own climate effects this summer was the smoke coming out of Canada from the forest fires.

4.4 millimeters or .17 inches per year. Annual rate of sea level rise

With extreme warming, <u>global sea levels will likely rise as much as 3 feet</u> by the end of this century, enough to swamp many coastal communities, threaten freshwater supplies and submerge some small island nations.

In terms of climate havens, the Midwest is immune from sea level rise since we aren't on either of the coasts. But we may end up getting climate migration with people escaping drought, hurricanes and forest fires.

Less than 6 years. When the world could breach the 1.5 degree threshold.

Humans can emit only another 250 billion metric tons of carbon dioxide and maintain at least even odds of meeting that goal, scientists say.

As I look around me, we aren't ready yet to let go of fossil fuels. Changing into something unfamiliar really puts an emotional hurdle in front of people. Yet change we must or the consequences get more severe, the more we use.

43 percent How much greenhouse gas emissions must fall by 2030 to hit the temperature target.

If you hear in all the different media sources, saying we aren't doing enough. Here is the main reason. We are only really challenged by our own emotional minds to accept the change. And change we must.

1 trillion dollars a year Climate finding needs of developing countries

Also coming out of the media is why we should help other countries. We are one in all of humanity. The more we connect together on this issue the safer we are in our own communities and families.

7 trillion dollars. World wide fossil fuel subsidies in 2022.

What is strange about this number is that this is a \$2 trillion increase from the year 2020. World wide planning shows governments plan to produce twice the amount of fossil fuels in 2030 than would be consistent with 2030 for the 1.5 degree target.

1000 gigawatts. Annual growth in renewable energy needed to keep 1.5 degrees in reach.

Last year, countries added about 300 gigawatts, according to the agency's latest <u>World Energy</u> Transitions Outlook published in June.

Now we have another number of how we are not doing enough for the ideal earth temperature increase. With Christmas coming and Thanksgiving behind us, can we dig down and make connections with people in our divided media world. I know in my family it is very difficult with certain members. In order to even have some harmony amongst ourselves, this is the topic that doesn't work.

In spite of the reality of the dark clouds of climate change, the silver lining can possibly be forging relationships for the cause of our futures for centuries to come. Do you suppose that could be a hard sell? This is a world wide transformation on many fronts. Maybe we can ask for this for Christmas?
