# **The President's Column February 2024 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo**



I promised in the last newsletter that we would be sending out information to help you better understand what has been happening with the Article II revisions proposed by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). That information accompanies this month's newsletter. Allan Lindrup has held a series of forums for UUCC last year detailing the actual changes proposed by the UUA, so you are aware of them. The information sheet that we are sending you today contains the back story behind it.

One thing that makes Unitarian Universalism unique as a religion is that our churches are autonomous and self-governed. "Congregational Polity" is a phrase that you might hear in conjunction with this. It means that each UU congregation sets its own bylaws but comes together in an annual democratic assembly to make decisions that can affect all member congregations. We use a delegate system where each congregation sends delegates yearly to GA (General Assembly) to represent their congregation and vote. Therefore, a majority of members of our UUCC congregation will vote in June of this year to decide if we will accept or reject these proposed Article II changes. Many UU churches are deciding whether to continue their connection to the UUA, or to leave and join with other like-minded UU churches.

If you listen to any of the YouTube videos listed on the information sheet you will get an idea of the timeline of historical events that took place to bring us to where we are today. Essentially it is the perception that white supremacy is the basis of all current social problems. In 2017, the former UUA President, Rev. Peter Morales, resigned from his position over a claim that a job in a Southern UUA region was given to a white male over a minority female, thus demonstrating racism within the UUA. Around the same time, two anti-racist activists proposed an 8th Principle to our established seven. They had been working on this since 2013 and believed that a "good" UU could follow the seven Principles without ever thinking about or confronting racism at the systemic level. Therefore, this new 8th Principle was necessary. Some 125 UU groups and congregations have adopted the 8th Principle.

But that was not the end of the conversation on white supremacism. Our religious tradition has been addressing "racist practices" and vowed to root them out many times over the years. But in recent years, we in the U.S. have witnessed a rise of overtly racist elements coming into the national forefront that had not previously been tolerated. This was followed by a strong backlash in this country by left wing groups such as Antifa and Black Lives Matter taking to the streets. It is not surprising then that a liberal religion such as Unitarian Universalism would become focused on such issues. It is not an overstatement that the UUA began to fixate on white supremacy as the explanation for all social ills and it has been suggested that this is the real reason we are seeing this revamping of our seven Principles. A few UU ministers began to push back on this oversimplification of racism and were immediately silenced – or "dis-fellowshipped" – and were left without their congregations or their pensions after serving entire lifetimes within the UU church.

The distribution of the book, "The Gadfly Papers" by Rev. Todd Eklof, set off a firestorm at the 2019 GA. Rev. Eklof has since led a movement to splinter off into the group "The Fifth Principle Project" arguing that the UUA is no longer a democratic organization. Some Black ministers, such as our friend, the late Rev. Finley Campbell, were also against such actions. These forementioned videos, writings, and websites are all included on our informational sheet. Start by watching a video to get a clearer picture of what is happening.



# **GREEN SANCTUARY**BY JEFF GREEN - FEBRUARY 2024



As I start out, the temperature outside is 15\*F and the interior of my car is 44\*F. It sits in a garage that maybe gets heat from the apartment above. During this cold blast, the batteries are comfortably isolated from the bitter cold outside.

There has been news around about people having trouble with their EVs in this bitter cold time for charging at superchargers. I haven't experienced what the people in the article are going through. I have, however, experienced driving in some stiff cold weather EV wise.

Here in this article, there was one person that was driving their car too close to empty in the cold and the car literally shut off. Not going anywhere, it was time for a tow. Although the gauge told them there was charge left, the batteries had a different idea. Other situations of charging during the cold, the cold batteries need to warm up before they are charged at very high rates from the superchargers. On my home charger outdoors in the cold, I noticed no charging taking place for about 20 minutes. On the supercharger from the article, it would take longer before charging starts since the batteries need to be warmer.

One of the things I have noticed on my dearly departed last EV is that the expected range of the car shifts as it warms up. This shows up as the percentage of battery left over at the end of the trip. On my many trips to the cottage in Michigan during the cold weather, I get into the right-hand lane and go slow. This is where the most efficiency lies in driving an EV, is just go slow. And I watch the percentage prediction shift most of the time in my favor of more charge left over. This is my comfort zone. Occasionally, I would see the predicted charge left shift lower. Time to keep an eye on this to know what is happening. Over time things swing in the way of my comfort zone. If not, play it safe and look for chargers on the way. Better safe than sorry.

I had very little worry in driving my dearly departed Model S. Compared to present day EVs, this was a shorter-range car, and I was very comfortable with it. Another cold weather symptom that also shows up in my present EV is that cold weather changes the regeneration for braking in the car. If the batteries are cold enough, there is no regeneration braking. It turns into a coaster when you let off the foot pedal. If you are driving long enough, the batteries warm themselves with heaters, and you get your regen back.

From the link above is some of my personal experience with cold EV driving, taking tips from the article listed,

How to preserve an EV batter in cold weather.

**Charge indoors whenever possible.** As noted above, my garage is 25\*F warmer than the outside air.

**Precondition your EV.** Take advantage of the EV being hooked up to the grid. Warm the car up ahead of time with your app. If you are on a long trip with a Tesla, use the trip router to get you to the next charger. The programming in the car will pre-warm the batteries to prepare for the next charging. This cuts down on charging time.

**Conserve heat to conserve battery.** There is a difference of heating the cabin to 75\*F or above as compared to 70 or lower. For my own tastes, I am comfortable **Continued**

at 68 to 70. In our area there are plenty of chargers available to drive with all the heat you want. I picked up my mother up

for Christmas, that lives 150 miles away with fewer chargers available along the way. My long-range Tesla Model 3 has over 300 miles range in the cold. I charged to 80% capacity in Rochelle Illinois, drove over 200 miles on the return trip without charging on the way back home. 6% was left in my battery range. The good part of this is that, if I saw on the way back home that I wasn't going to make it, there are plenty of chargers in our area.

Part of the lengthy road to electrification is getting used to using batteries in place of a gas tank. Although it is clear to some people about the effects of burning fossil fuel on the climate, it's hard to let go of gas. For myself, I leaped and accepted whatever consequences there would be for my decision. Everyone has their own way of putting their toe in the water to see when and where they will take this leap. And I say, "Come on in, the water if fine".

Thank you for letting Green Sanctuary be part of your experience.

The <u>Multi UU Church Environmental Book Club</u> has existed for about two years, meeting monthly via Zoom. Members of Beverly Unitarian Church, the UU Community Church in Park Forest, and First Unitarian Church of Chicago have been participating, but as we have lost a couple members in recent months due to death and serious illness we are hoping to reach other UUs who are concerned about the environment, who might wish to join our group. We have just finished our reading and discussion of *Regeneration* and have voted that the next book we will read and discuss will be *All Hell Breaking Loose: The Pentagon's Perspective on Climate Change*, by Michael T. Klare. Renowned security expert Michael Klare shows that the U.S. military sees the climate threat as imperiling the county on several fronts at once. The Pentagon is intensely focused on climate changes effects. Its response make it clear that where it counts, the immense impact of climate change is not in doubt. This book club now meets on the <u>third Monday evening of each month</u>, <u>starting at 7 p.m.</u>, with sessions lasting 75 to 90 minutes. 


# Faithful Gathering

The Irish spring festival of Imbolc traditionally honored a Celtic goddess called Brigid (or Brigit), who invokes fertility, prophecy, and fire. Like her season, she is a goddess of multitudes and contradictions. She is a goddess of healing, fertility, and motherhood, but also of passion and fire. This season reflects the dichotomy, the promise of spring and the continuing brutality of winter.

Imbolc falls exactly halfway between the Winter Solstice (Yule) and the Spring Equinox (Ostara). Daylight is increasing and spring is the air. While too early for planting gardens, Imbolc was a time to start thinking about what you wanted to plant and harvest in the coming year.

Ways to Celebrate Imbolc:

Fire and Candles: Fire is a traditional aspect in many Imbolc traditions. Light candles around your house or have a bonfire outside in the crisp night air.

**Intention setting:** Imbolc is a reflective time to look deeper into your goals and intentions for the coming spring. Meditate or journal with your intentions and think about what you want to tend and grow this year in yourself and your world.

#### Spring Cleaning and Cleansing Ritual:

Start early on spring cleaning. Begin a donation box to weed out unnecessary clutter or old memories. Make space in your body and home for the burst of new energy that spring brings.
