The President's Column June 2024 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquiza



(This is from the President's Report given at the May 19, 2024, UUCC Annual Meeting)

I would like to take this opportunity to let you know some of the things that the Board, Staff, and Volunteers have been doing around the church during this past year, 2023 to 2024. We have been busy making improvements to the church over this past year and continue to look ahead to the future and the work that still needs to be done. Much of our service work continues as it has for many years, for example, our work with PADS and Respond Now. We look for ways that we can make a difference in the world by helping others.

During these past two years, my thought was to increase rentals to provide us with a stable source of income for the future and avoid the necessity of using money from our endowment funds. To do this, we needed to renovate some areas of the church to create a desirable space to attract potential renters. The next few years we will be concentrating on bringing in those rentals.

Much has happened here in the two past years. We are still coming out of the Covid pandemic, and it has still managed to cause a few of our members to become ill. Luckily, most of our members have pulled through the pandemic unscathed, either because of the vaccines and boosters, or their own strong immune systems, and we are thankful for that. We no longer ask our visitors to Sunday services to wear a mask unless they feel the need to protect themselves or if we have a guest speaker who requests it.

In a matter unrelated to the pandemic, we have unfortunately just lost the wife of our church musician, Chris Ussery. Sadly, Patti Ussery passed away on Mother's Day. During this past year we had only one new member join our congregation, so our membership has been down, and so have our pledges. It is never too late to make a pledge because it will allow us to plan and do more necessary upkeep and repairs around the church, as well as fund projects and services that we would like to provide to our congregation and community. We hope to attract other like-minded individuals to our church, and we have just implemented a Publicity Team that will be working on ways to get the word out.

We have had the good fortune to gather a team of individuals together in our Rentals Team that have been wildly successful in their overhaul of our kitchen and other rooms in the building to elevate our surroundings to pre-flood and pre-pandemic glory. This remarkable team, headed by Irene van der Hoek, has renovated the kitchen with new appliances that were needed. Working with a donation of money provided by Fred Segner in his wife Pat's memory, we have a new gas stove with two ovens and a new dishwasher, soon to be installed. These will be used by members and future renters. The Rental Team carefully researched all our options, and in conjunction with the Board, decided that for the types of events that we currently hold at the church that this was the best plan for the kitchen. The Team also cleared out and organized some of the rooms of the church building in preparation for rentals in the future. Outside, they have replaced lighting around the building and parking lot to increase safety. The Board has been impressed by the work that went into these projects and their clear and concise updates delivered each month to us. We owe them a great debt of gratitude for all their hard work.

Other work has also been completed around the building which includes light fixtures that have been changed, a toilet that was replaced and other plumbing problems solved. Outside, the back deck was power washed and stained. The canopy over the front walkway has been lifted and repaired, and the handicap door opener replaced as well. We have removed the rundown wooden swing set to the west of the building, and it has been hauled away. The grounds will be cut and trimmed throughout the summer. Trees have been trimmed and we have plans to keep the poison ivy around the grounds to a minimum as best we can for everyone's safety. We are currently looking to have the building exterior power washed and we are going to get estimates to have it painted as well (it has been many years).

We have brought in some new rentals to UUCC in the past year. We had a cooperative home-schooling group called WAITT rent space from us last Fall and they have plans to do so again. We also brought in a new Japanese Martial Arts group which rents space from us three times a week and is led by a retired GSU professor. There has been renewed interest in pagan services here in the past year and they have held ceremonies marking the passage of the seasons several times. This has brought in people from around the community as well and has been led by Angela Denk and Melanie Pittman.

It has been my great privilege and honor to act as the President of the Board of Trustees at UUCC for the past two years and I want to thank my fellow Board members for their hard work as guardians of our congregation. We have a very unique, liberal and democratic community church here that is one of the best kept secrets of the south suburbs. Let us attempt to spread the word with

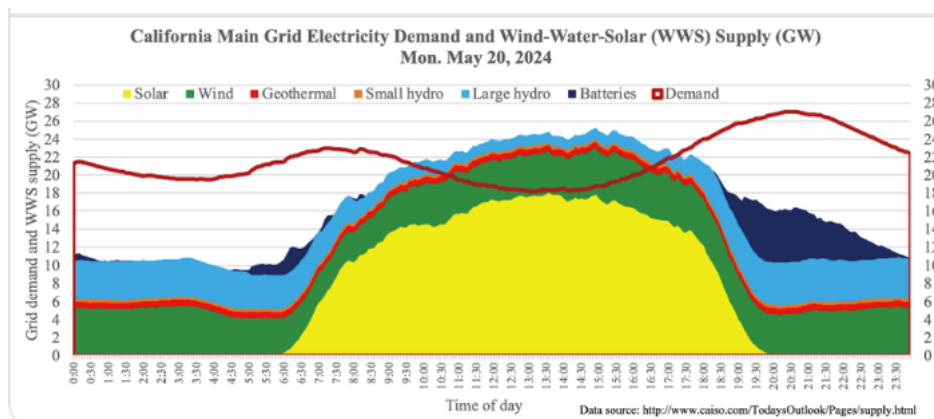

On our journey to clean energy throughout the world, milestones are appearing of clean energy that have never happened before. In the more progressive states for rapidly changing, the need for fossil fuels is starting to take a back seat to our electricity needs. California is pretty much the leader in renewable energy transformation in the United States and most of the world.

Springtime there is more sun and wind and this is helping California to have hours several days in a row of not needing fossil fuels. Some people say this is impossible and it can't be done and list all the reasons it can't happen. Of course, the worst things will happen to those that abandon fossil fuels. In a major clean energy benchmark, wind, solar, and hydro exceeded 100% of demand on California's main grid for 69 of the past 75 days.

May 21 update: *Stanford University professor of civil and environmental engineering Mark Z. Jacobson continues to track California's renewables performance – and it's still exciting. In an update today on Twitter (X), Jacobson reports that California has now exceeded 100% of energy demand with renewables over a record 45 days straight, and 69 out of 75:*



The yellow hump in the middle is solar energy. This colored graph is only renewable energy. The part that is white is what needs to be filled in with another form of energy, I would assume it to be mostly fossil fuels. That top red line is the demand of the utility for energy.

The yellow just touches the demand line in the middle of the day and the other Renewable energies shoot up above. That deep blue is the batteries that California has for the grid. These were filled up during the day and were used when the renewables could no longer meet the load entirely. As this middle day hump gets larger and there are enough batteries and outside utility territory to absorb this, less and less fossil fuels are needed. This is how we do it. It is being done now, has always been possible, and we are not going to fall off the edge of the earth doing so.

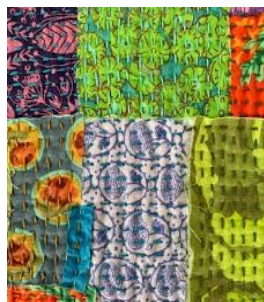
Summer Solstice or Litha



Litha occurs during the Summer Solstice between June 19 -22. More commonly referred to as Midsummer's Night, Litha is a time to celebrate the abundance and beauty of Mother Earth. Flowers are in bloom and gardens are producing fresh vegetables and fruits. The sun is at the height of its power during Summer Solstice and appears to linger at the same point on the horizon in its rising and setting for the days surrounding solstice. For most of us in the Northern Hemisphere, the sun is directly overhead at midday during Summer Solstice. Try standing outside and see how little shadow you cast. RAINBOW CAFE

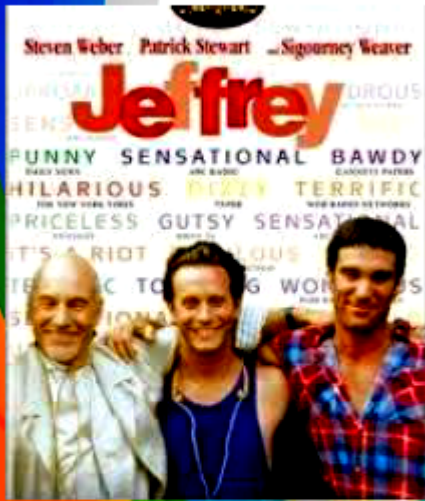
Rainbow Cafe will meet on Friday, June 21st, 2023.

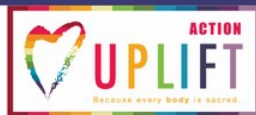

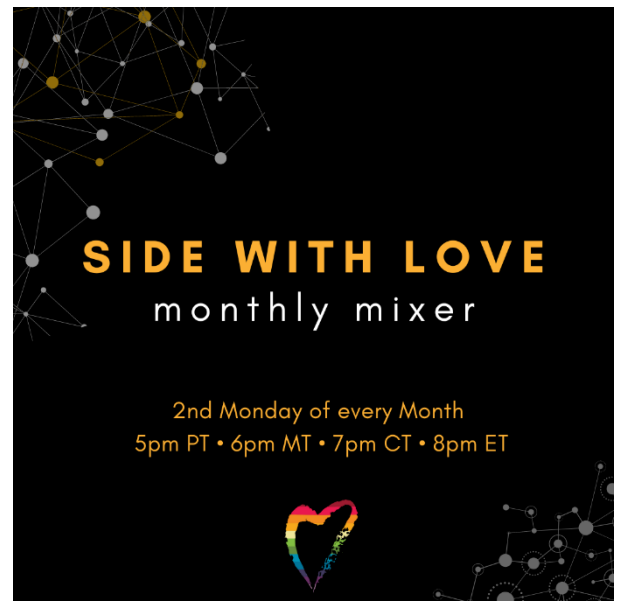
