Financial Update

GREEN SANCTUARY BY JEFF GREEN - SEPTEMBER 2024



Sometimes as we are growing up as children, our interests peak in school over some part of what we are studying. I was nowhere near the brightest in my class, although I enjoyed my interactions with all my classmates. I was in chemistry class and a small section came up for batteries. I was studying this ahead of time the

night before. There was a light in me that absorbed the information like a sponge. The next day was our lab and I could explain the interactions of the chemistry quite well while the others were still gaining traction. Can I explain that today? No. But my point is, this was the start of my interest in batteries.

Add in renewable energy and electric vehicles and now there is a whole field of large batteries to do the work of storage for different purposes in our society. Batteries have grown in our society enormously in value and function. I just ran into a study online that has talked about electric utility batteries for Illinois. Since we have to get rid of fossil fuels, we need a way to stabilize the grid since we are going to use intermittent energy sources like solar and wind. Grid level batteries have been designed to do the job.

Adding 8.5 GW of energy storage could save Illinois ratepayers \$3B: study

However, the state may need up to 15 GW of storage to maintain grid reliability, according to the report backed by clean energy groups.

Building 8.5 GW of 4-hour energy storage systems in Illinois could save the state's ratepayers \$3 billion from 2030 through 2049, mainly by lowering wholesale capacity prices, according to a study released Monday.

The storage capacity, which would cost about \$25 billion, would also produce \$7.3 billion in benefits by reducing power outages and up to \$4.9 billion in benefits from less air pollution, The Power Bureau, a consulting firm that wrote the study, estimated.

One of the issues of building an electric grid is that it is looked at in the long term. In 2049, should I be alive, I will be 95 years old. This is part of the plan to leave fossil fuels in the ground rather than polluting our air. I am assuming the 8.5 gigawatts (giga=billion) cost is the \$25 billion listed above. It seems to have an interesting list of benefits.

Ratepayers save \$3 billion. This is in your electric bill.

Power outage savings \$7.3 billion. Businesses lose money when power goes out.

Less air pollution savings \$4.9 billion. I will assume health benefits on this one.

Assuming I understand the article correctly, we are investing \$25 billion and will achieve \$15.2 billion in savings by 2049. Another possible 10 years beyond 2049, the investment would pay for itself.

Living in Illinois, I am quite happy what we Illinoisans are doing quite well in a United States perspective. <u>H.B. 5856</u> and <u>S.B. 3959</u> are pending in the Illinois legislation right now. Should you notice you have the chance to comment in the future at the appropriate time, please do so. Our future needs our participation.

As always, I'm grateful to have the position of chatting with my fellow UUs on our green future. Thank you for letting me be a part of your reading pleasure.

She was active in League of Women Voters, the 50th Anniversary Celebration of Park Forest, as well as participating in electoral campaigns, and recording oral histories of World War II veterans. 



Helping Liberal Religion Thrive

The **North American Unitarian Association (NAUA)** is open to membership by individuals or organizations (such as congregations). There is no specific membership donation, it is a free-will donation system. An organization can be a member of NAUA while concurrently being a member of the UUA or any other non-profit organization. During this church year we will share with you some of the offerings of the NAUA.

On the second Tuesday of each month NAUA's Academy has an educational offering, which involves a presentation, followed by discussion by attendees. These sessions start at 6:30 p.m. Central Time. The Sept. 10 session will end by 8 p.m., when the Presidential Debate is scheduled to start. One must register in advance to be sent the Zoom codes. Here is the description for the Sept. 10 offering, which is titled Evolving Humanism: The roots of humanism lie in ancient wisdom literature, which reflected on justice, fate and the life well-lived. The Renaissance Humanists rediscovered that literature and advocated for the values of human life, especially clear thought, eloquence, and civic engagement. In the early twentieth century a group of Unitarian ministers advocated a liberal Christianity without a deity as the natural next stage of human evolution, and they claimed the name 'humanism' for their movement; but a century of wars and ongoing crises have undermined their confident dream of Progress.

In the twenty-first century a new humanism integrates biology and behavioral science into a more pragmatic appraisal of the possibilities and hopes of human life.

How have these various humanisms addressed the perennial concerns of human life: love, meaning, morality, work, and death? What is humanism now? How will humanism evolve to address the challenges of our stone-age minds in a technological age?


