The President's Column November 2024 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo

Hello all! I am extremely glad to be back with you here, writing my monthly newsletter article again after having some health issues this summer. But all is well now, and I am hoping that you, too, are doing well.

I want to tell everyone about a new and exciting rental that will be coming to UUCC in a few days. We all know that we have worked with Respond Now (a social service organization) over the years by sending them donations of money, food, clothing, supplies, and even some from our congregation volunteering time at their site on Emerald Ave in Chicago Heights. We have shared a close relationship with them and their Executive Director, Carl Wolf, who has given sermons at our church over the years. Now we will be renting them space in our church.

A few years ago, some "Red State" governors thought they could gain political points with their base by sending buses full of immigrants that had crossed our southern border and were waiting for their court cases for asylum. Thousands of Venezuelans were sent to Chicagoland on hundreds of buses two years ago by Texas Governor Greg Abbott. By sending these people to "Blue States" in the north they could avoid the financial burden of supporting these asylum seekers themselves. Some of these buses arrived in University Park, as well as other local communities. At that time, I tried to contact area officials to see how UUCC could help, but I got nowhere in the confusion of that time.

The State of Illinois had to scramble to find money in the state budget to care for the immigrants, leading some citizens to anger because of competition for these funds. Funding was eventually made available through a series of grants through the state to be administered through existing social service organizations, like Respond Now, in local communities, such as University Park, Chicago Heights, Ford Heights, and Sauk Village. A third round of this funding recently has become available, and this time Park Forest applied and was awarded a grant. The Village of Park Forest reached out to Respond Now to disperse the funding designated for rental assistance and other resources. This is particularly important now because the state is planning to close the temporary shelters and move the immigrants into housing. Respond Now was required to do this within Park Forest and so they looked to work with area churches.

Carl Wolf approached our board this past month and asked if we would rent space to Respond Now to have an office here to offer rent assistance & other social service programs to those people in need, such as these immigrants. Our UUCC board saw this as an opportunity for our church to help and we approved this request. Continued

As of November 1, Respond Now will be occupying Classroom 3 with their desks, laptops, file cabinet, and a printer to begin serving the community.

The funding for this program will continue through June 2025. Then they will have to reassess if they would like to continue this program. There will be three or four caseworkers present from Respond Now Monday through Friday to see applicants by appointment. There will not be any food pantry involved nor donations of clothes or supplies.

One reason I love UUCC is the history we have of doing good whenever we have had the opportunity. We have always sought to demonstrate our beliefs by our deeds rather than just words. Our work with organizations such as Respond Now and PADS has permitted us to be of service to those in need in our community. I believe this to be a tremendous opportunity for us to do some good and help newcomers to our country who need such services as rental assistance, access to ESL classes, and help signing up for medical assistance--all services that will help them make the transition into a foreign and sometimes confusing new country. This is something many of our ancestors had to do when they first arrived in this country. We have worked with Respond Now for decades and know them to be a trusted organization for positive change. I know our congregation will be warm and welcoming to this new addition to our church.

Financial Update

As of the end of September, we are 25% of the way through the 2024-25 fiscal year. Have you paid 25% of your pledge? Some of you have not yet made a payment. Others have paid their pledge in its entirety. We appreciate all of your financial support. So far this year, our income has exceeded our expenses by about \$1,000 per month. Our investments in the UU Common Endowment Fund have also grown. So, for the time being we are in good shape financially.

The Audit Committee is being formed. We need two members of the congregation and one member of the Board to review the financial transactions from last year. Allan Lindrup has already volunteered to be the Board Representative. Are you interested in joining him for this task. This should require 2-4 meetings to go over paperwork to confirm the computer data. Please be in touch with Allan Lindrup or Treasurer, Nancy Irons.

The parking lot, which was resealed and painted two years ago, is already needing attention. We are pursuing the sealcoating company for a partial refund, but I doubt that will happen. So, we will probably have another major expense in the spring to redo the parking lot. It has also been suggested that it is time to power wash and repaint the building, but that too will probably have to wait until spring. So, while we are financially sound right now, we can anticipate more expenses in the spring.

GREEN SANCTUARY BY JEFF GREEN - NOVEMBER 2024




After getting married in June 1992, I couldn't wait to learn more about renewable energy. I was going to energy fairs, subscribed to Home Power Magazine, taking classes on renewable energy, and helped to start a RE fair for Illinois. We met 19 times once a year for 19 years. Bob and Sonia Vogl who managed the fair have basically aged out of it about the same time that covid hit the country. You can't do

this alone; it takes a team to pull it off. Going up to the Wisconsin Energy fair, I was looking for volunteers to put on a fair with. Along Bob and Sonia came to my booth in 1998. Our first fair was started in 2001, and the last one was in 2019. Renewable energy was less than 1% of our nation's electricity when the first fair started. Truthfully it was like a magical time to be a part of the energy fair.

The IEA expects an overhang of oil and liquefied natural gas (LNG) in the second half of this decade, as well as an oversupply of manufacturing capacities for technologies such as solar PV and batteries.

You may have heard the phrase, "God laughs at the best laid plans". Whether this happens as they say, we shall see. According to IEA, there is going to be a glut of energy. This strongly suggests we will see lower costs for our energy prices. If it is handed down to us, we can see some relief to our pocketbooks for our energy.

Low-emissions sources are expected to generate more than half of the world's electricity before 2030, the IEA reckoned, while demand for coal, oil and gas is seen peaking by the end of the decade.

This is one of the most important points to come out of this report is the decrease in our pollution rate around the world. According to the article, our energy history has gone from coal to oil and now will moving into the age of electricity that will sourced more and more on clean electricity. At the heart of this is China. Going from one of the dirtiest forms of energy to the cleanest.

The Asian superpower's solar power generation alone could exceed the total electricity demand of the US today by the early 2030s, he said.

As I continue interacting online with strong doubters of China's intensions to go clean electricity, I couldn't pass up the chance to put this out there. Despite our geopolitical tensions with China, I'm happy to give them credit for what they are doing right.

<u>Continuing today's policy settings – which come down to an absence of a sharp decline of global carbon dioxide emissions – the world is on course for a rise of 2.4° Celsius in global average temperatures by the end of the century, well above the Paris Agreement goal of a rise limited to 1.5°C, the IEA said.</u>

Humanity is being challenged right now to change our energy habits or suffer even stronger consequences of climate. In another climate called politics, who will help us progress towards a cleaner energy lifestyle and who will drag their feet. Our votes do make a difference, and I hope you will vote your conscience in the booth this election year.

Dear Friends,

The last several years I have knit, donated and sold scarves for the holidays.

This begins our fund for the March International Women's Day collection for the International Convocation of UU Women. For the last

several years one of the ICUUW's recipients has been a group called Providence.

Thanks to the generous donations of donors like you, the total amount that Providence has provided for various humanitarian and educational activities to support Ukrainian refugees and those internally displaced - since the onset of war - has reached 350,500 USD. Providence has set up sites for refugees in Unitarian Churches in both Transylvania and Hungary. Our funds support those impacted by Russia's invasion of Ukraine in the past year. Since this report, there has been an additional aid shipment to southern Ukraine (Odesa, Mykolaiv area), bringing the total deliveries to 20 (11 to Transcarpathia and 9 to Southern Ukraine).

We can be proud to contribute to relieve the suffering of the elderly, women and children who have fled to safety in the face of the Ukrainian War.

Scarves will be available again in November and we will be celebrating International Women's Day with a special collection for the ICUUW.








Edgars Place is proud to present Buddy Mondlock. A native of Park Forest he has had an outstanding careeer. Buddy writes songs. He does it so well that some great songwriters have recorded his songs on their own albums. Guy Clark, Nanci Griffith, and Janis Ian, to name just a few. You might've heard his song "The Kid" (recorded by David Wilcox, Peter, Paul and Mary and Cry, Cry, Cry). When Buddy made his first trip to Texas from his native Chicago, Guy Clark heard him singing one of his songs under a tree at the Kerrville Folk Festival and liked it. So Guy went back to Nashville, opened the door and said, "listen to this kid, he's good!" A publishing deal soon followed.

People were starting to pay attention. In 1987 he was a New Folk Award Winner at Kerrville and he released his first album called "On the Line". Over the next few years David Wilcox recorded "The Kid" on his first record for A&M. Buddy did some writing with this other new kid in town named Garth Brooks (they had the same manager). Janis Ian heard him singing at the Bluebird Cafe and asked him if he'd like to write with her. Their song "Amsterdam" got recorded by Joan Baez. Nanci Griffith asked Buddy to sing on a show she was taping for Irish television. She ended up liking that song so much that she recorded "Comin' Down In the Rain" on her Grammy Award winning collection "Other Voices, Other Rooms." Garth became a star and "Every Now and Then" ended up on his album "The Chase."

Since then he's released a string of critically acclaimed solo recordings on his own label and EMI. And in 2003 Buddy toured North America and Europe with Art Garfunkel and Maia Sharp in support of their album "Everything Waits To Be Noticed" which they wrote and recorded together as a trio.
