The President's Column April 2025 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo



"Come on, people now...Smile on your brother...Everybody get together...Try to love one another right now..." (1)

The person who sang this song, Jesse Colin Young, recently died on March 16th. Do you remember hearing it from the 60s? It became the anthem of our generation at the time. The words and music embodied what many of us were feeling and wanting to accomplish. Fast forward to 2025, and now it just seems like "...just a dream some of us had." (2)

I have been thinking a lot about the changes our generation has gone through in the almost sixty years since this song appeared. "Love", "peace", and "flower power" have been replaced with resentment, greed, and entitlement, brought to the forefront by angry politicians who have used them to stir up some of our worst instincts. The question that many are asking is "why"? Why has our society shifted so sharply? I do not think it would be too much of a stretch to say that I wake up wondering what fresh hell we are going to encounter today.

What has changed? Values...the individual beliefs that motivate our actions. Today's values have shifted substantially since the 1960s with a large segment of our population until the gap between us seems insurmountable. I hear both politicians and pundits talking about how we need to better communicate with one another but differences in wealth, education, and basic values seem to make that a distant goal. Some have amassed wealth based on their race and gender and seem unwilling to share with those living in poverty and a lack of opportunities based on their race or ethnic identity.

It may not be a coincidence that that period between the 1960s and today also saw the rise of secularism in our society. Protestant Christian denominations in the United States have lost a significant percentage of followers. Evangelical Christianity, ironically, has been responsible for much of this political shift in our society as they attempted to look for ways to return to their idealized vision of past society that many would like to recreate. And unscrupulous politicians on the right have used this desire for their own advantage. The interesting result of this has been that it has caused many to veer sharply away from actual Christianity—the principles and teachings of Jesus Christ (the "love and peace" component). How can this be?

We are now just over two months into the new presidency and things are already chaotic and confusing. That which we had been dreading has happened again. We are seeing daily acts of cruelty and social violence that are beginning to shock us into action. As an example, we hear of deportations of immigrants by ICE by literally snatching people off the streets or out of their homes, schools, or workplaces, and put on planes to be flown south, often not even to their countries of origin. It appears that there have been many on the right planning for this moment and are hellbent to get as much done as possible and as quickly as possible. The speed of these actions is mind-blowing.

As UUs, these changes hit us especially hard. Many of us who were young during the 1960s still believed in the values expressed in the songs of that generation, like "Get Together." We share a greater vision of how love and peace could transform our world into a better place. We do not look backward to the past but forward to how we could achieve a peaceful world where we could live together in harmony and shared prosperity, and we could begin in earnest to clean up our environmental issues...a world where we would celebrate our differences and embrace them. "A time for peace, I swear it's not too late." (3)

Solidarity Circle Report



On January 22nd, 50 year old Roger Lewis, was released from prison after 35 years of incarceration. On February 9 many of UUCC's members, plus a few friends, attended a forum where Roger told his life story, plus his hopes for the remainder of his life.

At this time Roger Lewis' main challenge is to get all the documentation he needs to get on with his life, i.e. to get driver training, to get vocational training that interests him, and to pursue job opportunities of various types. Roger has recently secured a certified copy of his birth certificate, a letter certifying his coverage by Medicaid, and some documentation to establish his residential ad-

dress. He has an appointment with the Social Security Administration on April 17, to get the name on his Social Security card corrected. Once he has a corrected social security card, Roger should qualify to get a state ID. After that he can get on with his life. Roger is enjoying his freedom to be outside up to 12 hours a day and does a lot of walking for exercise, plus has a membership in a local park district gym.

Roger's miscellaneous expenses, which at this time are generally paid by Allan Lindrup, are reimbursed out of UUCC's Solidarity Circle fund. To make a contribution to that fund, make your check or other donation payable to UUCC, with Solidarity Circle in the Note section.

At this time donations are still being matched dollar for dollar.

GREEN SANCTUARY BY JEFF GREEN - APRIL 2024



In conversation with the doubters, it goes something like, "If we stopped fossil fuels completely, some ungodly number of people would die." My question to this person was, why do you go to an apocalyptic scenario all the time? Then I flipped the script and showed the person online an apocalyptic scenario based in science. If we go on the course of the present administration, we reach higher levels of destructive green house gases in the atmosphere. This brings about changes in our living space we may have great difficulty adapting to. Ok well, let's see what Deep Seek AI would come up with in exploring a global warming future. I typed in "What part of the shared socio-economic pathways is like an apocalypse?" Shared socio-economic pathways is the language describing warming in their modeling of what our future might look like.

From Deep Seek: In the IPCC Sixth Assessment Report (AR6), the Shared Socioeconomic Pathways (SSPs) are scenarios that describe different future societal developments and their implications for climate change. Among these, **SSP3** and **SSP5** are often associated with more severe outcomes, but **SSP3** is the one that most closely resembles a dystopian or "apocalyptic" scenario. End Deep Seek.

I didn't expect the SSP3 scenario to be the most apocalyptic. SSP5 is the most extreme but is the society in agreement to go full on fossil fuels.

From Deep Seek: ### SSP3: Regional Rivalry - A Fragmented World

- -**Characteristics**: This pathway envisions a world of extreme fragmentation, with countries focusing on self-interest and regional security. There is little international cooperation, and socioeconomic development is uneven. Inequality rises, and technological progress is slow. Environmental policies are weak, leading to high greenhouse gas emissions and severe climate impacts.
- **Climate Impact**: By the end of the century, SSP3 could result in high global warming (around 4°C or more), leading to extreme weather events, food and water shortages, and widespread displacement of populations.
- **Why It Feels Apocalyptic**: The combination of societal breakdown, lack of cooperation, and severe climate impacts creates a scenario that could be described as chaotic and dire, resembling an "apocalypse" in terms of human suffering and environmental degradation.

SSP5: Fossil Fuel-Driven Development – A High-Emissions Future

- -**Characteristics**: SSP5 represents a world of rapid economic growth fueled by fossil fuels. While it doesn't involve societal collapse, it leads to extremely high greenhouse gas emissions and severe climate change impacts.
- **Climate Impact**: This pathway could result in global warming exceeding 4°C by 2100, with catastrophic consequences for ecosystems and human societies.
- **Why It's Less Apocalyptic**: Despite the severe climate impacts, SSP5 assumes continued economic growth and technological advancement, which might mitigate some of the worst societal outcomes.

Summary

SSP3 is the pathway most akin to an "apocalypse" due to its focus on societal fragmentation, inequality, and lack of cooperation, combined with severe climate impacts. SSP5, while also leading to extreme climate change, is less apocalyptic in terms of societal collapse.

End Deep Seek

From the Park Forest UU church, Maryland Ragland got up to the microphone and talked about radical hope for people of color. This would be for their right to live a fair and just life in our society. I find myself living in hope all the more with administrations that work against taking action for the climate. It is in hope of better political support in the future. I'm in gratitude for what was accomplished in the Biden administration and will find a few places to help support the movement into more favorable politics and action.

The best bargain we can have is to spend our money wisely to build a clean energy system for all of humanity. One step at a time, one system at a time. It is not an easy task in our present politics, but an important one.

MESSAGE FROM THE REVEREND MS. DENISE TRACY

Good morning!

This year, the world celebrates 30 years of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, a visionary 1995 roadmap agreed by 189 governments to achieve the equal rights of all women and girls.

UN Women's latest report reviewing the past 30 years shows that despite progress in certain areas, there have been numerous setbacks. The number of women and girls living in conflict and experiencing conflict-related sexual violence has increased by 50%. A woman or girl is killed every 10 minutes by a partner or family member. Three-quarters of lawmakers are still men. About the same percentage of the world's population is living under autocratic rule, and, as we know, the weakening of democratic institutions has gone hand in hand with backlash to gender equality. As U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said, "Instead of mainstreaming equal rights, we're seeing the mainstreaming of misogyny."

"As bad as it looks, as hard as this moment is, we are in it because we're winning," believes Tarana Burke, founder of the #MeToo movement.

We, all of us at ICUUW, are in it because we're winning. We are in it because we're part of a community of U/Us who believe in our mission to make the world equal and better for everyone.

The establishment of the International Convocation of UU Women was sparked by the first international gathering of U*U women and people of progressive faith, here in Houston, in 2009. The organization has come a long way, offering a variety of programs, projects, and resources moving the needle toward gender equality - for UU communities and beyond. We are currently the only international U/U organization working directly with U/U communities around the world.

As an organization in consultative status with the UN Economic and Social Council and members of the U.S. Women's Caucus, an alliance of U.S. feminists, our advocacy efforts have become increasingly important. Next week we are inaugurating our Spring Seminar in conjunction with the annual UN Commission on the Status of Women meetings in New York City. U/Us from around the world will connect, learn about the UN from seasoned experts, and engage in conversation circles.

Many women may feel that their rights and bodily autonomy are slipping through their fingers. You or one of your loved ones may be one of them. But now is not the time to panic. Now is not the time to capitulate. Now is the time to make noise - to be part of a movement - to organize together in grassroots advocacy.

Now is the time to join our movement. If you are not already on our email list, I urge you to go on our website to sign up for our newsletters and join as a member. If you want to meet fellow activists, build connections and hear about the good work happening in our networks, attend our twice-a-month Zoom gatherings.

As bad as it looks, as hard as this moment is, we must keep pushing for change. Women and girls cannot wait for another 30 years for equal rights.

Please give generously so we can persist and resist.







Not revealing her pregnancy, Dedee eventually moves in with her much older half-brother Bill, a gay teacher in a conservative, suburban community in St. Joseph County, Indiana. Although he is living with Matt, Bill still mourns the loss of his previous partner, Tom, who died of AIDS some time ago. Bill maintains a friendship with Tom's younger sister, Lucia, who idolized her brother.

Dedee seduces Matt, then tricks him into believing he has impregnated her. They elope, leaving Bill and Lucia to track them down.

Rainbow Café is a social event that provides a welcoming and safe environment for single or partnered gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender adults, and their allies. Group is open to anyone regardless of their sexual orientation.
