The President's Column October 2025 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo



Do you suffer from chronic pain? It is estimated that about 25% of everyone in this country suffers from some form of chronic pain. And while most of these folks are older adults, there is still a sizable number of young people who are suffering as well. It is an enormous problem as it affects our national productivity, healthcare costs, mental health, and contributes to a diminished quality of

life.

This problem with chronic pain is compounded by the safety and efficacy of pain relievers available. We have all heard of the "opioid epidemic" which started in the 1990s in this country and was driven by pharmaceutical companies, principally Purdue Pharma. They falsely claimed that their drug OxyContin would not cause addiction but in fact led to destroyed lives and deaths. By 2009, stiffer regulations imposed on these opioids caused many addicts to switch to heroin which was both abundant and cheaper. This led to a sharp rise in overdose and deaths. BY 2013, synthetic opioids such as Fentanyl (which is 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine) emerged and caused a sharp increase in deaths. Fentanyl is so potent that even getting it on the skin can potentially lead to death.

Doctors initially believed the pharmaceutical companies and freely prescribed OxyContin as a miraculous pain reliever to their patients in ever increasing amounts without the knowledge of the dangers. Many patients became addicted, and lives were ruined or resulted in deaths as their bodies quickly became accustomed to the dosage and needed more to relieve their pain. As doctors became aware of the truth, they quickly backed off writing prescriptions for these drugs as regulations tightened and for fear of facing prosecution themselves. They were left to recommend that their patients rely on less effective forms of pain relievers, principally Acetaminophen, or NSAIDS such as Ibuprofen or Naproxen Sodium. There were dangers to abuse these pain relievers as well as they can cause organ damage in large doses. All drugs, to a certain extent, have both benefits as well as side effects. The idea that any pain reliever could be taken freely and without potential problems has been laid to rest. That has left patients with chronic pain with few reliable and safe options.

There are many possible causes of chronic pain: as many as the stars in the sky. Some diseases and conditions bring their own pain along with additional symptoms. Chronic pain can be caused by injuries and last a lifetime. Arthritis, especially, brings a great deal of pain to most everybody as they get older. There can be an upside to pain: it is sometimes our first inkling that there is a problem in our bodies.

Pain can affect us both physically, mentally, and spiritually. It can fog our minds and destroy our enjoyment of life. It can make life exceedingly difficult and cause us to look for any form of relief, no matter how desperate we are. Pain can interrupt sleep cycles causing people to be chronically tired during the daytime. Many people look to sleep to allow our bodies to "reset" from their pain. So how can we best deal with our pain? There is no easy answer. Many of us have been frightened by the opioid epidemic of the 1990s and do not want to risk taking too much medication, so we just live with our daily pain as best we can.

We ALL have pain at one time or another but how many of you live with chronic pain? The kind that begins when you first open in eyes in the morning and sometimes does not end until you eventually fall asleep at night. Everyone's story of their pain is uniquely personal. Some people find that their pain can completely overtake them and drain their lives of joy. In some cases, it can be the largest problem that they face in life if their pain is intense. If you find that your pain is affecting your quality of life, please seek ways to connect with others to share your problems. We have individuals in our congregation that are available to listen. If there is a need identified, I could envision a "pain group" being formed to share strategies to improve lives. What do you think?

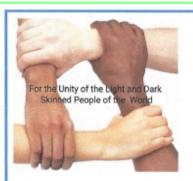

Solidarity Circle Update



Solidarity Circle - In late August Roger Lewis and his girlfriend were invited, by a couple who are relatives of Roger, to move into their home in Bement (a town in central Illinois, east of Decatur) rent free, in return for Roger's girlfriend providing home health care (work she has done before) to the older woman, who recently had a stroke, while Roger performs various maintenance work around the house. Roger would have enough free time to be able seek either full or part time work at one of the local employers. Roger and his girlfriend decided to accept this option. Roger's girlfriend moved down to Bement August 1, while Roger followed about a week later, after getting approval from his new parole officer. The UUCC Solidarity Circle working with Roger has consequently ended. The remaining funds in the UUCC Solidarity Circle account will remain there until UUCC is asked to assist another returning citizen who is moving into

the south suburbs of Chicago.

PRO. Dr. Alan Spector has worked for racial justice in general since his college days at the Univ. of Wisconsin, later as an SDS organizer. While working toward his PhD in Sociology at Northwestern, he helped found the International Committee Agsinst Racism with Dr. Finley Campbell. He was a professor at Purdue Univ. Calumett/Northwest for 45 years and has given dozens of presentations on issues of race-ethnic justice and served as President of the Association for Humanist Sociology.

Depending on fossil fuels means having to drill faster and faster to keep standing in place. Which is called the Red Queen syndrome below. I have run across articles showing on a world wide basis, we are spending \$500 billion per year in the last 4 years. 70% to 80% of annual investment goes to replacing existing oil wells. The United States is 68% shale oil well population which is the fastest declining kind of oil well.

This is where my kind of argument comes in. Not only is burning fossil fuels harming our climate, it's a long term loser financially. You could be taking all that steel and putting it into solar and wind, and getting 20 to 50 years performance rather than 3 to 5 short years on a shale oil well. Its just common sense.

Red Queen Syndrome refers to the phenomenon in shale oil production where companies must continuously drill new wells at an increasing pace just to maintain stable output levels. This concept is named after the character from Lewis Carroll's "Through the Looking-Glass," who explains that it takes all the running one can do to stay in the same place.

Production Replacement Calculation

- Global oil production: ~80 million barrels per day
- Annual production decline: 4-6% across all existing wells

Requires drilling approximately 3-4 million new wells annually to maintain current output (I believe 3 to 4 million is a global number).

The \$500 billion annual investment is essentially a mandatory operational expense to prevent a catastrophic decline in global oil production. It's not optional but a critical requirement to maintain current energy infrastructure and meet global energy demands. End Claude Haiku.

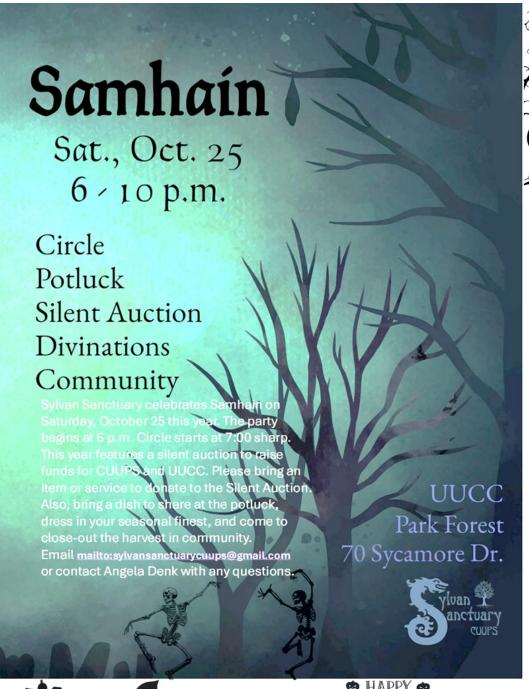

With attacks on our UU values and the democratic system itself increasing, many of us are seeing a need to ramp up our efforts. Simple **legislative advocacy** efforts like our Action of the Week emails and witness slips continue to be important, and we will continue to offer them. Actions that take more effort - like customizing your letters, making phone calls and meeting with legislators - are more impactful, and we have started offering more of these opportunities to make a difference. These will be needed as we seek to help pass crucial <u>climate</u> and <u>restorative justice</u> legislation in this October's veto session in Illinois, and to stop US funding of the genocide against the people of Gaza.

Beyond such advocacy, we know that the electoral process has a significant impact on what happens legislatively. So we are gearing up for the next round of <u>VoteLove</u> (as UUtheVote is known here in Illinois). Here, too, we will continue to offer simple actions like writing postcards to encourage people to vote. And we plan to offer actions that take more effort - like community for

rums, <u>phonebanking</u> and <u>knocking on doors</u> - that have been proven to be even more effective. It's not too early to consider what level of participation you're up for.

And beyond all this, we are seeing the rise of an authoritarian regime threatening our democratic system and the rule of law. Many UUs are joining the just-launched **One Million Rising** campaign of strategic noncooperation and nonviolent resistance. Two actions that you can take now are: <u>Ground Avelo Airlines</u> and <u>Signs of Solidarity against ICE</u>. You will hear more about this campaign in the weeks and months ahead.
