The President's Column January 2026 by Laurene Lambertino-Urquizo



I want to let you know that this spring we will be launching a capital campaign to raise funds to fix our parking lot. It is one of those inevitable jobs that must be done for an institution such as our church, along with having to fix roofs, replace furnaces and make repairs to plumbing and electrical systems. As homeowners, you are familiar with this. There are always things that need to be done to our homes. It is a reality of life.

Although we have been on an upward trajectory in recent times with the improvements we have made to the church and the increased rentals, we have encountered a problem with our attempts to fix our crumbling parking lot. A few years ago we hired a sealcoating company to give us an estimate of the cost to patch potholes, sealcoat the entire parking lot and paint the lines designating the parking spaces. (I will not give the name of said company here, but it is attainable by calling the office.)

Initially we were given an estimate of \$6,800 to complete the work of patching the potholes with hot asphalt and seal major cracks with hot rubberized coating, then sealcoat the entire parking lot. This also included painting white lines for the parking spaces and handicap spots. We accepted this offer and the work was begun. Then the problems occurred. The material they purchased to complete the job was absorbed by the parking lot surface at a greater rate than they had expected. They then had to purchase twice the amount of materials, more than doubling the cost that they had initially quoted us, and the final job totaling \$15,200. We were given a 5-year warranty on the job, but the coating was nearly worn away within 2 years. When we complained about this, they claimed that using salt on the parking lot voided their 5-year warranty, although none of their paperwork (estimate included) mentioned any such warning. The use of salt is a standard treatment employed by most snow plowers to melt the ice and snow, so this was an important omission on their part in all fairness.

We tried multiple attempts to get this company to come and inspect the situation, but they ignored us. Finally, we turned to our attorney to contact them in hopes of having them realize the gravity of the situation and come to some resolution, but they did not reply. Our attorney then advised that it would probably cost us more to pursue them than we could realistically expect to recoup from them. So, in the end, we regrettably had to let it drop.

Now we are left with a parking lot that clearly needs to be repaired before it becomes worse with our extreme Midwestern winters and summers, after having spent \$15,200. We have researched the entire issue thoroughly and have obtained eight bids from three paving companies to fix our parking lot. These bids highly recommend removing and replacing a large portion of the parking lot asphalt.

As you might expect, the prices are substantially higher than before. We have researched these companies with the Better Business Bureau for certification of their work, paying particular attention to their warranties. More information will be provided as to the monetary amounts and the identities of these companies as we move forward.

This is why we are planning to launch a capital campaign to raise the funds needed to repair our parking lot. This is a necessary expense to keep our property in proper condition to maintain our property value as well as for safety purposes. We are looking to target February, the month of Love, to kick things off and we are asking for your generosity in any amount to help fund this large expense. There will be some form of matching donations from a group of three, consisting of two Board members and one other member of the congregation.

We do not receive any funding from outside sources, so it is up to us to maintain our church and grounds. It is entirely our responsibility to ensure the survival of UUC, both physically as well as spiritually. Please be generous and help us to reach our goal. We are counting on you to make this a success.



With great sorrow we inform you that **Bill Decker**, passed away in the early hours of Monday, December 29th. He was the loving husband and partner to Reverend Denise Tracy. This was an unexpected and tragic loss. A memorial will be held for him at UUC in the spring. More details will be forthcoming.



Financial Update

We will soon be launching a Capital Campaign to raise funds for parking lot repairs, and resurfacing. These renovations are expected to cost over \$45,000 and will more than deplete our Capital Fund, which currently stands at \$17,000. We would like to raise \$25-30,000 through a matching fund campaign. It is also possible that we will need to tap into our endowment investments to help pay for this project. Please consider what you would be willing and able to contribute. We truly depend upon and need your support.

GREEN SANCTUARY

When it comes to global warming, how are things changing in my area of the country? There are some rules of warming on earth that science has observed. The north and south poles are warming faster than the average earth temperature increase. About 10 to 15 years ago, the number was the arctic is warming twice as fast as the rest of the earth. Now we are getting science claiming we are at 3 to 4 times faster warming at the north pole than average temperature increase. AI (artificial intelligence) rounded that up quick and easy.

Key Insights on Arctic Warming

The scientific evidence is clear and alarming:

- The Arctic is warming significantly faster than the global average, a phenomenon known as "Arctic amplification"
- Researchers from North Carolina State University confirm that the annual mean warming rate of the Arctic is more than three times the global average

A study published in February 2025 by Julienne Stroeve explicitly states that the Arctic is warming at four times the rate of the rest of the planet

Consequences of Rapid Arctic Warming

The accelerated warming has profound implications:

- Increased frequency of extreme events
- Rapid sea ice loss (12.2% reduction per decade)
- Potential for ice-free Arctic summers by mid-century

Cascading impacts on ecosystems, infrastructure, and global climate systems

The dramatic warming rate underscores the critical importance of understanding and mitigating climate change, particularly in polar regions which act as sensitive indicators of global environmental changes.

Key Insights on Land Surface Warming

According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), there are critical distinctions in warming rates:

- Land surfaces are warming much faster than the global average
- 20-40% of the global human population lives in regions that have already experienced over 1.5°C of warming
- Most land regions are experiencing greater warming than the global average
- Ocean regions, by contrast, are warming at a slower rate

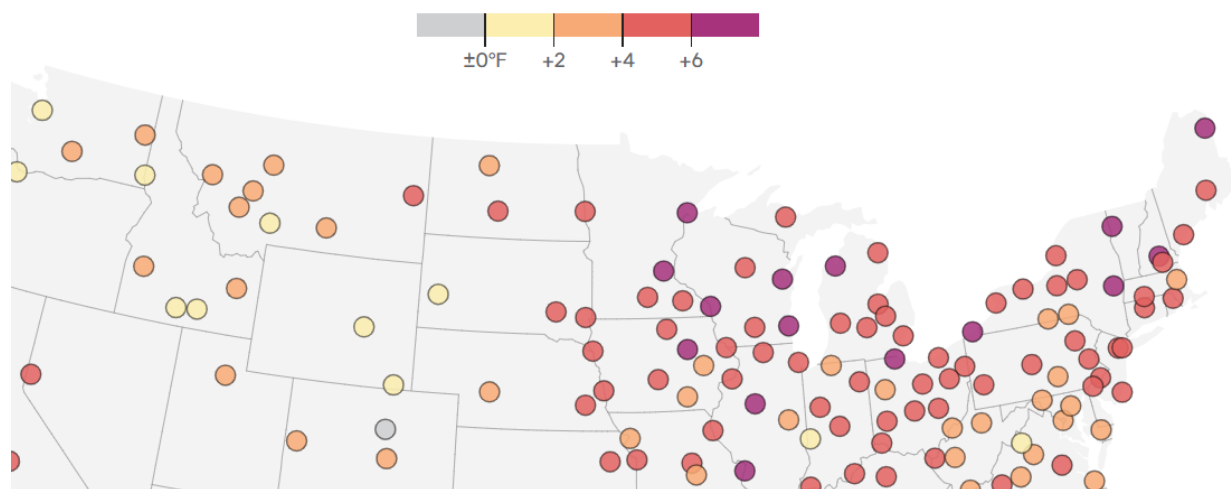
The interesting part of this is that 1.5°C = 2.7°F. If you go to the link provided, putting your cursor over one of the dots of interest to you, there is a measured change in winter temperature for that area. And it is presented to us in Fahrenheit. So keep in mind the average temperature increase of earth is approaching 1.5°C or 2.7°F soon. My formative years were near Dubuque Iowa, 4.7°F, Rockford Illinois, 5.9°F, Chicago Illinois, 4.5°F, Milwaukee Wisconsin 7.3°F, Green Bay Wisconsin 7.0°F, South Bend Indiana, 2.9°F, Grend Rapids Michigan, 5.5°F.

The interesting part of this is that our local winter temperature increases play out the science scenarios. Even South Bend is experiencing an increase in temperature at a rate that exceeds the global average for warming.

Green Sanctuary 2030

Greetings!

At the Unitarian Church of Hinsdale, we have begun work on the new program provided by the UU Ministry for Earth, called Green Sanctuary 2030. We are studying closely the component called Community Resilience—cultivating communities of care to prepare for and respond to climate disruption.

We have determined that one of the biggest effects of climate change in the Chicago area is the increase in flooding. What used to be 100-year floods now occur every year or two. And of course, the areas most stricken by floods are often those least able to cope with them. We asked ourselves, What would we do if a good friend or a relative were to be flooded out and called for our help? Well, we would go there and do whatever we could.

From this discussion came the idea of inviting our congregation to participate in a kind of rapid response team; when a flood occurs, we will reach out to the neighborhood affected and offer our help in the immediate crisis—cleaning out basements, offering food and fresh water, helping with repairs. Our church members can take part in the solution without having to join committees or go to meetings—just pledge to be available in times of emergency. And we avoid the kind of action where we try to “solve their problem”—we help in whatever way they know they need.

We would like to know if you have been working on Green Sanctuary 2030, and your experience and thoughts about the program. Specifically, we would like to know if you have given thought, at your church, to this kind of community resilience work. If multiple congregations could participate in rapid response to flooding, we can all multiply our compassionate efforts in times of crisis. I invite you to let me know what your church is doing in this area, and how we can work together.

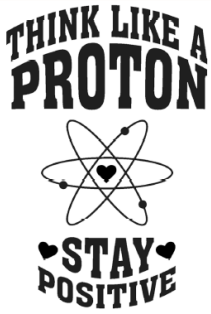


Quarterly Social Justice Collections

In November UCC members and friends were invited to nominate social justice (including environmental) organizations that either operate in Chicago's southern suburbs or do advocacy or direct service work that impacts the lives of residents of the south suburbs. We were seeking to end up with two organizations, for special collections in the first two quarters of 2026. (In the spring we will seek nominations for the four quarters of the next church year). Only two organizations were nominated - the **UU Advocacy Network of Illinois (UANI)** and the **UU Prison Ministry of Illinois (UUPMI)** - so the congregation will not have to vote to select the two with the greatest support. Both of the nominated organizations were found to meet the criteria the UCC Board had set. The Board will select one Sunday in the quarter beginning January, and one Sunday in the quarter beginning in April, to hold the special collections. Cash donated on those Sundays, plus checks made payable to UCC with "Social Justice" in the Note section, will be consolidated and sent in a single UCC check to the social justice organization selected for that quarter. More about the work of each organization will be shared shortly before and on the Sunday of the special collection.

With attacks on our UU values and the democratic system itself increasing, many of us are seeing a need to ramp up our efforts. Simple **legislative advocacy** efforts like our Action of the Week emails and witness slips continue to be important, and we will continue to offer them. Actions that take more effort - like customizing your letters, making phone calls and meeting with legislators - are more impactful, and we have started offering more of these opportunities to make a difference. These will be needed as we seek to help pass crucial [climate](#) and [restorative justice](#) legislation, and to stop US funding of the genocide against the people of Gaza.

Beyond such advocacy, we know that the electoral process has a significant impact on what happens legislatively. So we are gearing up for the next round of [VoteLove](#) (as UUtheVote is known here in Illinois). Here, too, we will continue to offer simple actions like writing postcards to encourage people to vote.

We also offer actions that take more effort - like community forums, [phonebanking](#) and [knocking on doors](#) - that have been proven to be even more effective. It's not too early to consider what level of participation you're up for.

And beyond all this, we are seeing the rise of an authoritarian regime threatening our democratic system and the rule of law. Many UUs are joining the just-launched [One Million Rising](#) campaign of strategic noncooperation and nonviolent resistance. Two actions that you can take now are: [Ground Avelo Airlines](#) and [Signs of Solidarity against ICE](#). You will hear more about this campaign in the weeks and months ahead.
